

Columbia University is accepting applications for a 2-year fellowship program in general medicine, pediatrics and family medicine, with a focus on urban community health. The **Primary Care Clinician Research Fellowship in Community Health** is a collaborative effort of the Division of Child and Adolescent Health, Division of Medicine, the Center for Family and Community Medicine, the Mailman School of Public Health and NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital. The purpose of this fellowship is to provide a strong academic, research and clinical foundation for primary care physicians who, for the duration of their careers, will remain dedicated to the care of poor minority children, adolescents and adults and who, as general academic physicians, will become leaders in the campaign to reduce health disparities.

This fellowship focuses on two areas, health disparities and community health research and entails:

1. advanced training in research skills including completion of mentored research projects and a publishable manuscript(s) in urban community health;
2. pursuit of a Masters of Science at the Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health;
3. core didactic curriculum in fellows' meetings consisting of research skills and academic development;
4. clinical practice and teaching of primary care in an urban, underserved community in New York City

Positions are available for July 2013. Interviews are granted on a rolling basis; the deadline for submission is October 15, 2012

Federal guidelines restrict the fellowship to U.S. citizens and permanent residents. We are particularly interested in receiving applications from underrepresented minorities. In addition to MD applicants, we also accept PhD applicants interested in primary care related research.

In addition to stipend and benefits, fellows receive coverage of the tuition and fees at the School of Public Health.
